#### **Principal's Report - Farewell Year 12**

The class of 2018 has been farewelled at two great assemblies this week. They are a proud group of Riversidians who have the name Team #majestic, coined by School Captain, Hannah. I love this as it defines the positive energy and attitude of the cohort. They know how to show commitment – from organising 'I love Riverside Day' to encouraging all students to connect and value each other.

The poster of the 2017/18 leaders in the foyer includes a number of statements from each of the leaders including 'bold leadership'; 'see the worth in the people surrounding you'; 'discover your purpose' and 'be proactive and be the person to succeed'.



The People's Choice awards was very close but went to this coloured pencil work by Jessica Huang. (main picture).



Their design solutions addressed real world issues including the need to reduce food wastage during shopping and transportation processes, providing custom designed flat pack cake plates, a sustainable café interior and a mobile environmental learning truck to educate young children about the importance of implementing sustainable living practices in their everyday lives.

The laser cutter was also used to create a vibrant tessellated wall clock and a stunning mixed materials gold and black light fitting. The students showed that they are true 21th century learners as they willingly sort out and developed their expertise with these new technologies.


